## Bay House Team puts on a great performance in Debating Matters competition

The Sixth Form debating team (led and coached by English teacher Mr Archer) did a fantastic job in the Southampton Debating Matters competition, a contest supported by the Academy of Ideas and involving extremely rigorous debates and questioning from judges.

The whole team worked together exceptionally well. They comprised Megan Eddles, Hannah Gill, Joe Kirby, Oliver McLaren, Fintan O'Byrne, Joseph Taylor and Rebecca Taylor.

Participant Fintan O'Byrne offers his unique take on the experience:

'The Debating Matters championship came to Southampton for the first time at Solent University. Bay House sent a team of seven Sixth Formers - under the supervision of the incomparable **Mr Archer** and the unimpeachable **Mr Tapp** - to take part in the debating competition.

For the first debate, **Joseph** and **Rebecca Taylor** (no relation) faced Alton College over the proposition that 'Tourism benefits the world'. It was an oratorical massacre, and once Joe and Becca had soundly

trounced the opposition it was time for lunch.

After the Bay House team was treated to sandwiches and apples (courtesy of NATS Holdings, who had sponsored the event), it was time for the last debate of the qualifying round. Joe Kirby and Oliver McLaren faced St Swithun's School, a private girls' boarding college in Winchester. The motion being contested was 'Social media sites should filter out fake news stories' (which the Bay House team opposed). Despite a passionate, rational argument from the Bay House side, the judges somehow decided St Swithun's had won

and Bay House was sadly removed from the running.

In the final, St Swithun's faced off against the boys of St George's College - another independent school, this time from Weybridge - discussing whether monuments to controversial historical figures should be removed. After an exceptionally mediocre performance from St George's College, St Swithun's were duly declared the Southampton champions and will now move onto the next stage of the competition.

However, all was not lost: **Joe Kirby**, for the demonstration of exceptional critical thinking

skills in his debate and in his questioning throughout the competition, was awarded the title of 'Highly Commended' by the panel of judges.'

The Sixth Form Debating Club provides an opportunity for students to engage in the issues that really matter. From gambling to EU membership, gun crime to Christmas adverts, they're always on the lookout for new members to join their opinionated team! The society meets weekly to hold a structured debate on a motion selected by its members and they ensure that no point is left unpicked!

### Five Beaches performances commemorate D-Day Landings anniversary

Following a successful run of performances five years ago, a group of male actors from Year 10, 11 and the Sixth Form took up the challenge of reviving *Five Beaches* for the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the D-Day Landings.

Written by Zella Compton, directed by Ms Jones and using the words and experiences of veterans, Five Beaches tells the story of the soldiers who left the shores of Britain to land on the German occupied beaches of Normandy in June 1944.

The first performances took place at the D-Day Story, Portsmouth on Sunday 5 May and Explosion Museum, Gosport on Monday 6 May to rave reviews – even resulting in an impromptu interview with BBC Radio Solent!





Five Beaches was performed again as part of the D-Day Commemorations at Stokes Bay on Saturday 1 June and at Southwick Village on Saturday 8 June. To perform at Southwick House, where Operation Overload was launched, was a real privilege and the cast impressed the audience once again.

Following a chance meeting at Explosion Museum with Radio Solent, the group was invited to perform an extract live and were interviewed by Steph Newenhouse on her show. It

was a wonderful end to a great project. I am extremely proud of the cast – James Cossens, Max Gleed, Stephen Gould, Gabriel Goulding, Jake Jones, Ethan Martin, Ryan McGarvey, Fintan O'Byrne, Harvey Smith and Daniel Weatherhead.

They worked incredibly hard and captured the emotions to convey the experiences of the young men who played a role in the landings, some of whom were only teenagers themselves at the time.

Bay House Sixth Form Art students have been working on some impressive outcomes in recent months, preparing their portfolios for final submission.


This year has seen cross disciplinary work with students being experimental in their exploration of media: from traditional drawing and painting to digital media, animation, sculpture and installation work.

## George Gilbert secures highly prestigious apprenticeship with Rolls Royce

Upper Sixth student George
Gilbert, who has just
completed A Levels in
Mathematics, Physics and
Biology, has recently secured a
prestigious four-year degree
apprenticeship with Rolls
Royce. In a hugely competitive
field of around 1000
applicants, George was one of
four successful candidates who
will begin working at their
Goodwood base in September.

The prospect of a more 'hands on' approach to learning offered via the apprenticeship route really appealed to George: the apprenticeship offers a blend of practical experience alongside one day per week of university study, and a guaranteed job with Rolls Royce at the end of the four years as well as a degree in mechanical engineering.

The application process required considerable dedication and resilience –



George applied for over 20 different apprenticeships across the UK before securing the Rolls Royce offer. Each had its own application process, invariably involving

invariably involving psychometric tests with follow-up video interviews or call-ups to assessment centres. Selection procedures can involve group tasks, presentations, problem

solving activities and one-to-one interviews.

The 1000 or so who applied to Rolls Royce were whittled down to 100 through on-line

psychometric testing; 15 were then invited to an assessment centre and from those 4 were finally selected, following various challenges and two demanding interviews.

George is looking forward to an induction weekend in August before beginning at Goodwood in September. His advice to other would-be apprentices: firstly, start investigating opportunities early in your Upper Sixth year. Secondly - be organised, resilient, and, if you aren't successful, learn from any feedback on how you can improve your performance next time!

Our congratulations to George on such an impressive achievement.
