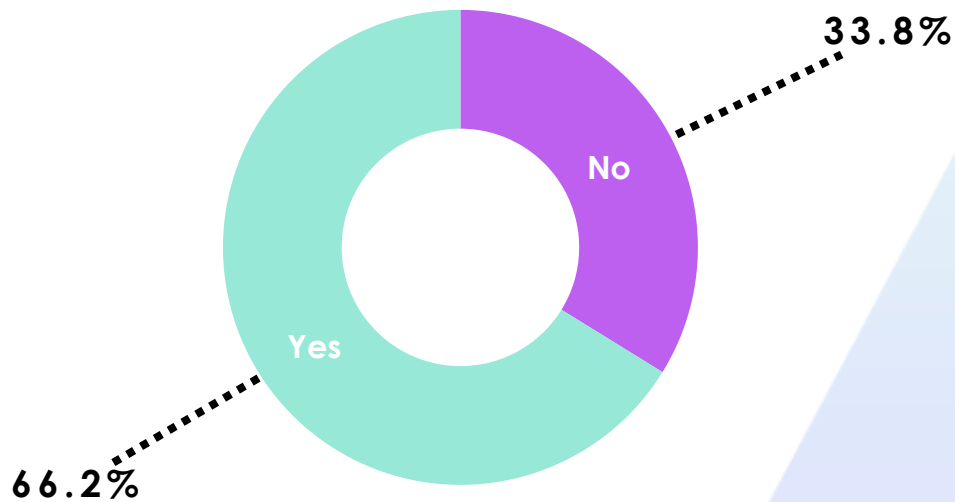

A CLOSER LOOK: THE AI OF THE STORM



On 11th September 2023, weather forecasters predicted that Hurricane Lee would move upwards from the Cape Verde islands in the Atlantic Ocean to Nova Scotia in Canada. They were correct - but an AI weather forecasting model made the prediction 3 days earlier.

Using information from satellites and weather stations around the world, the AI model calculates how clouds, temperatures, wind speeds, and other factors will interact with each other to create different types of weather. They send this information to meteorologists who make changes based on their knowledge of weather in their local area.

As climate change is leading to more extreme weather conditions, AI weather forecasting models can give people extra time to prepare for emergencies and save lives.

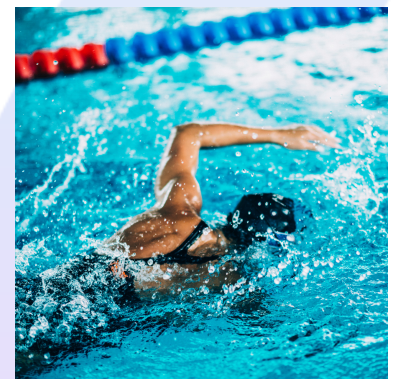
Kamala Harris calls for aid in Gaza
