

A CLOSER LOOK: WHAT ARE COOKIES?



Do you ever wonder what people mean when they talk about cookies online? They're not actually talking about sweet treats, but an online tool that helps websites to remember what you look at on the internet.

Like all technological tools, this can be helpful and harmful. Cookies help websites to make your online experience run more smoothly. For example, if you visit a website that uses cookies, it will remember your username for you. If you're doing some online shopping, the website uses cookies to remember what you have chosen to buy.

On the other hand, some websites use cookies to share information about what you have been looking at with other businesses. These are called "third-party cookies". If you don't want your information being shared, there are ways that you can prevent it on your internet browser and on each website that you use.


Disposable vapes to be banned
