

A CLOSER LOOK: MARY ANNING



In the past, women rarely had the chance to receive the same level of education as men. However, some trailblazers navigated their own routes in spite of this.

One such woman was Mary Anning. Born in 1799, she hardly ever attended school, teaching herself to read and write. After her father's death, Mary started selling fossils that she found on the local beach to support her family financially. While exploring the coast near her home, she discovered and excavated an Ichthyosaurus fossil. Mary developed a keen interest in fossils, teaching herself geology (the study of rocks) and anatomy (the study of living bodies). Despite making many discoveries and working with some major scientists, the Geological Society of London refused to admit her because she was a woman with no formal education. Her story has only been uncovered and shared widely in the twentieth century.


Further Post Office problems
