- process applications
- complete fraud and verification checks
- take part in education sector engagement

UCAS doesn't:


- make decisions or offers

Why higher education?

Opportunities while studying:

- Chance to study a subject they are **passionate** about.
- Achieve a qualification that could lead to their chosen career.
- Grow in **confidence**, make lifelong friends, and gain **independence** and important life skills that will widen their prospects.

Choosing the right university for you

- Style from the traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities, with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- Location some are based in large cities, others in smaller towns a major influence on the environment and lifestyle.
- Size larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- Culture and facilities influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- What graduates do all universities collect destination statistics. It can be interesting to find out the types of jobs or further study students go on to.
- Tuition fees can vary between course providers. Check if there are any scholarships or bursaries available.
- Living costs accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.



Choosing the right course for you

- What does the course cover?
- Courses with the same title may be very different.
- Look carefully at the core course content, and the range of optional studies/modules available.
- Which modules are the most interesting and relevant to your career aspirations?
- See if the course or university/college offers any internship, placement, or study abroad opportunities.
- How is the course taught structured teaching, or more independent research? How many lectures are there, and how much group work will be done in seminars?
- How is the course assessed?





Personal Statement Builder


Designed to help you think about what to include, and how to lay it all out. It counts how many characters you've used, so it's easy to see when you're close to the 4,000 character limit.

 - Oxford or Cambridge
- Simple application cost:
 - up to five choices £28.50

When to apply for 2025 entry

- 14 May 24 UCAS Undergraduate Apply opens for 2024 entry.
- **3 September 24** First day for receipt of completed applications.
- 2 October 24 Music conservatoire application deadline
- **15 October 24** Application deadline for courses in medicine, veterinary medicine/science, and dentistry, and courses at Oxford **or** Cambridge. (18:00)
- 29 January 25 Equal consideration application deadline. (18:00)
- 26 February 25 Extra opens.
- **30 June 25** Last date for applications before Clearing.

The personal statement

- The only section you have full control over
- Your only chance to market themselves individually
- The same for all of your choices
- A maximum of 4,000 characters, or 47 lines
- A minimum of 1,000 characters
- / There isn't a spelling or grammar check

No formatting is allowed

UCAS similarity detection service: every personal statement is run through software to check for plagiarism.

Tracking applications

The UCAS Hub allows applicants to:

- follow the progress of their application 24/7
- see their choices and personal information
- view their offers
- reply to offers online

A student can hold up to two offers:

- firm if they meet the conditions of the offer they will be placed here
- **insurance** if they are not placed with their firm choice, they may be placed with their insurance choice.


Other options

Extra (26 Feb - 4 Jul)

- Used all five choices and had no offers.
- Add Extra choices for consideration one at a time.

Clearing (5 Jul - Oct)

- Apply after 30 June, receive no offers, decline all offers, not met conditions.
- Find vacancies from 5 July and add a Clearing choice to your application.


Part 1: What's an apprenticeship?

- It's a real job where students learn, gain experience, study for a qualification and get paid.
- An apprentice is an employee, with a contract of employment and holiday leave.
- Over 650 different apprenticeships available, from Nuclear Engineer to Architect to Digital Marketer.



What are the benefits?

- Apprenticeships are funded by the Government and/or the employer so apprentices don't have loans or tuition fees.
- Wages vary depending on the industry but salaries can often be very competitive.
- By the end of an apprenticeship, they'll have the right skills and knowledge needed for their chosen career.



How does it work?

- 1. An apprenticeship takes between one to six years to complete.
- Apprentices typically work for a minimum of 30 hours a week (and most will work full time, between 37 40 hours per week). Part-time options are also available in some cases.
- 3. Apprentices have time away from their day-job protected for study. This tends to equate to about a day a week and is also paid time.






- There is no limit on the number of applications you can make.

- You can apply for universities and apprenticeships at the same time!


NEW: Smart Alerts

Smart alerts are a new matching service offered by UCAS.

The service enables students to be matched to regional vacancies.







Students register for Smart Alerts in their Hub account. Students enter information on their preferences such as location and area of interest. If this matches an employer's search criteria, then they are invited to apply.





UCAS Predicted Grades

Typically, we will predict you one grade above your Internal Exam Grade. However there are some exceptions:


- A's to A*'s A* are rare and rely on you performing well on every paper, so we cannot allocate everyone on an A grades A*s.
- If you have performed significantly better in your Internal Exams than other assessments.

UCAS Rules

Predicted grades should be:

- entered for all pending qualifications, unless the assessment method or structure of the qualification makes this inappropriate – failure to do so can lead to complications or, in some cases, the rejection of an application
- in the **best interests of applicants** fulfilment and success at college or university is the end goal
- **aspirational but achievable** stretching predicted grades can be motivational for students
- determined by **professional judgement** your expertise and experience are vital in informing predictions
- data-driven while each school will have its own process, you should look at past Level 2 and Level 3 performance, and/or internal examinations to inform your predictions
- finalised by the point of submitting an application universities and colleges are only likely to consider the
 predicted grades received as part of the UCAS application. While they will make every effort to accommodate
 genuine errors in data entry, this may not always be possible for highly selective courses

UCAS Rules

Predicted grades must <u>not</u>be:

- affected by student, parental, guardian, or carer pressure there are risks associated with inflating and suppressing predicted grades
- influenced by university or college entry requirements or behaviours predicted grades should be set in isolation of an applicant's university or college choice(s)
- affected by student behaviour or background predicted grades should be made objectively and disregard external factors. Be careful to reflect on any preconceptions to mitigate against unconscious bias, particularly for **protected characteristics** (including sex, race, religion/belief, disability, sexual orientation, or gender reassignment)



First task: personal statement

- To be sent to their tutor by Friday 24 May
- A key part to the application. They only write one.
- 47 lines/4000 characters (inc. spaces) Approximately 500 words
- Show your strengths, why you're passionate about the subject, work experience relevant to your application and ambitions
